"This provides an opportunity to solve problems and build quality of life together. Another way to put that is to build a sense of community beyond a certain location, into a sense of involvement, belonging, and taking personal initiative to make a positive difference. And the agencies don't run the show; they're just one more player at the table, looking for ways to contribute to the larger goals of healthy people, healthy communities, and healthy landscapes."

> "This brings a new avenue of communication to all these separate groups: versus the lawsuit approach, where there are always winners and losers."

"The international quality of this natural area makes it distinctive: the border is part of the story."

"Seems like right now, judges make decisions, which creates winners or losers. That works against the idea of working together on an outcome that works for all of us. We need to find a way to work on what we share in common rather than focusing on our differences. Right now, each group has its own management plan, its own way of doing things. This is a chance to start building a bigger picture, a more inclusive plan, together. Even the most contrary group adds value by providing checks and balances to the process."

"This project can connect urban industry folks to natural resources folks."

"This will encourage communities to work together in new ways."

"Organizations will better see the whole region, not just their little piece of it."

"We're focusing on our commonalities, not our differences."
